Celebrating St. Louis @ 25!!!

There are many milestone birthdays, anniversaries and achievements to celebrate in one's lifetime. Your parents celebrated your first step and first words. Recall the frustration, falls and thrill of learning to ride your bike. Summon up the awkwardness and excitement of your first dance and the importance a dance would have on your wedding day. And remember that first day driving through the campus entranceway of your new college or university. All may be early memories before turning 25. So, what's so special about being 25?

Being 25 mirrors that silver lining on cloud nine. This point in one's life is one for pause; a reflection on what has been achieved; knowing that this stage is the height of energy and that there is so much more to accomplish. This year, **St. Louis Adult Learning and Continuing Education** celebrates its **25th Anniversary** as a school community. Our school has achieved so much and we have so much more to do!

In these very busy times, making the time to celebrate milestones, (even minor ones), becomes so critical. In a Catholic school community, we recognize highlights such as one's first day at school, the sacraments and tests of faith, student graduation(s), teachers being honoured for their impact and years of service, schools and our school board celebrating their historical significance and gifts to their community. Although St. Louis offers programming and courses for learners of all ages, these highlights of early years are relived for many of our students and St. Louis honours their achievements daily.

First Day of School -- Our **ESL/LINC** students are so brave to come to school to learn a new language, in a new country, as an adult. In some cases, these students have never set foot inside a classroom and entrusted us to care for their toddlers in their own school-like setting. Our International Language students have two "first days of school"; one at their Day School through the week and the other, their **Language School** on Saturdays. Some start as early as Junior Kindergarten!

Tests of Faith -- Coming back to school as an adult takes courage. Believing in oneself, when you feel that you failed yourself and your family takes faith. Having renewed hope that one can overcome whatever barriers were in the way is a driven spirit that many of our students sustain, as they hurdle through their last few credits or dare to learn to read. Being grateful for the opportunity to pursue one's goals, because they were given another chance, takes humility. And many more tests of faith are celebrated.

Graduation -- St. Louis, as a school community, has seen more than **200,000 learners** in its 25 year history. The class of 2010-11 was granted just over **400 Ontario Secondary School Diplomas** and another 280 industry-recognized certificates in **Chef, Hair Styling, Microsoft Office Specialist** and **Personal Support Worker** training. Our trustees, administrators, staff, guests and our students value this rite of passage, as one that everyone deserves, regardless of when they graduate from high school. On November 17 & 18, 2011 we saw more than 1,500 attendees at our two graduation ceremonies.

The Value of our Teachers -- With more than 350 teaching staff and administrative supports, St. Louis has been blessed to celebrate four teachers who have given 25 years of service to the WCDSB who are currently at St. Louis -- **Bev Billo** (SSC teacher Cambridge Campus), **Brenda Steffler** (Kitchener Guidance), **Beth Hobson** (Cambridge Guidance), and **Barbara Burgoyne**, (Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC) instructor at the Kitchener main campus) who began at St. Louis the first year of its opening, 25 years ago!

25 & 175 -- *St. Louis Adult Learning and Continuing Education* continues to be a proud part of the *Waterloo Catholic District School Board's* 175 year history and is proud to model the school board's mission to be at the heart of the community -- offering success for each, and a place for all! We invite you to celebrate and honour our school's silver lining and look forward to many more years together.
