Leadership & Service Catholic Schools -- Making Our Community Better

By the time you receive this newsletter, Thanksgiving will have passed and we will be preparing for Advent. Our focus will be on celebrating the birth of Christ – the central focus of our school system.

October brought many examples of thanksgiving...of being grateful. We witnessed some **1,600** students graduate from our five secondary schools and another **790** graduate from our St. Louis Adult and Continuing Education program. We wish each student the best as they pursue their dreams. We know each of them has been well equipped through the Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations to make a real difference in this world.

As a school system we have three goals for 2008-09. One concerns *improving student learning* while another involves *building the capacity among all to lead and learn*. The third, *nurturing our Catholic Community*, focuses us deeply on who we are as a faith community.

This newsletter has some interesting information on how we nurture our Catholic community. For example, there is an article on our **Pastoral Care Teams**. These teams are composed of voluntary team members from every facet of a school or central office staff. The teams respond to the spiritual needs of staff and students in good times and respond to crises and loss when times are tough. Pastoral Care Teams are the heart and soul of our Catholic schools.

A second example of faith in action is our annual report on **Charitable Giving and Missions**. Over the past decade our students and staff have raised in excess of **\$3 million** for missions, charities and special appeals such as Hurricane Katrina and Tsunami relief. These funds don't include the thousands of pounds of food and clothing donated each year by students and staff.

The amount raised or items collected for charitable giving and missions is a natural outgrowth of our belief that, through our Baptism, we have a responsibility to be brother and sister to one another. Within Catholic schools we challenge our students and staff to live out the **Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations**. We ask all to be “*discerning believers formed in the Catholic faith*” where faith is integrated with life. We also ask all to demonstrate their commitment as “*a collaborative contributor who contributes to the common good.*”

Nowhere is this more apparent than in our Grade 7, Grade 8 and high school classrooms where many students who are about to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation -- or who are engaged in retreats or simply meeting their diploma requirements -- will be participating in community service hours throughout the school year. This community service is an extension again of who we are...and serves as a shining example for our community.

As we approach Remembrance Day, let us recall the service and sacrifices of so many...let us reflect on what true service to our community really means...and let us honour those whose selfless efforts lift us up and sustain us.

A Gift Of Literacy & Learning

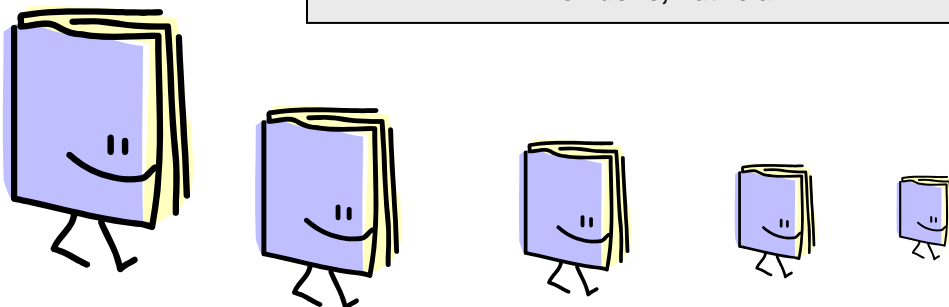

Pastoral Care Teams – Bringing Spirituality To Life

As Catholic Educators, we fundamentally believe that the Pastoral Care of our communities is critical to the social, emotional, and cognitive development of our learners. Our faith teaches us that each individual possesses an inherent and essential dignity and that such dignity reaches its highest potential when it contributes to the common good. The charge of Pastoral Care then, is to *foster the God-given capacity for goodness which each of us shares*. This means that every decision and action that we take must consider two questions; does this promote and proclaim the dignity of the person and does it allow the individual to reach the fullness of their potential by contributing to the community? In short, we are called to view all aspects of our professional and personal lives through the lens of relationships.

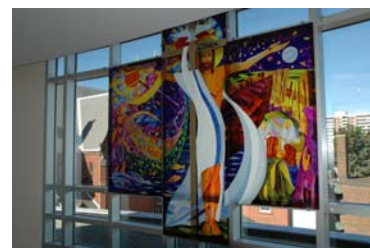
Much of the business of modern education can become impersonal and tied to mandate and initiative. It is the ever-present challenge of Catholic Education to keep the person at the forefront of anything we do. In order to live up to this calling, each site in the Waterloo Catholic District School Board has a **Pastoral Care Team** that is charged with providing leadership in this area. These teams coordinate liturgical celebrations, social justice activities, and opportunities for wellness and spiritual growth. They are resources in times of compassionate and critical care and constantly advocate for the marginalised within our communities. These groups gather throughout the school year in order to share best practice, learn, and fill their own ‘spiritual wells.’

This year, our system introduced a **Pastoral Care Policy** which articulates the importance and challenge of this work and a newly formed **Pastoral Care Council** which provides system direction and support while representing the full range of partners within our communities.

Ultimately, it is our system's belief that our professional practice cannot be divorced from our foundational faith. The life of Catholic Education exists within the space between people; the relationships through which we learn, grow, and – with the grace of the Holy Spirit – transform the world together as faithful disciples of the Risen Christ.

We ask that your prayers join ours in asking the Loving God to be with us in this vocation.

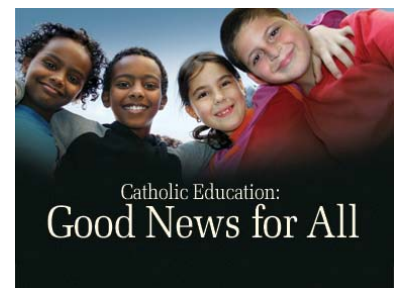
