## 25 Years Of "Extended Funding" Catholic Schools Celebrate & Remember

Ash Wednesday – the beginning of 40 days of reflection and sacrifice in anticipation of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ -- is celebrated this year on February 25<sup>th</sup>. As a Catholic school system Lent is obviously a central focus of our school year; a time to engage in sacrifice and anticipation.

This year marks the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of extended funding for Catholic schools in Ontario. Granted by then Premier William G. Davis, extended funding ended many years of sacrifice and high anticipation. Our parents and grandparents made many sacrifices to send their children to **St. Jerome's** and **St. Mary's High Schools**, to **Monsignor Doyle**, to **St. Benedict** and to **St. David**.

Reflections today may remind one of the various dinners, the parish levies and the individual sacrifices made prior to 1984 to pay tuition fees for Grades 11, 12 and 13. Reflections may also turn to the many members of the Religious – the **Congregation of the Resurrection** and the **School Sisters of Notre Dame** – as well as the many lay teachers and support staff who worked through many periods of personal sacrifice in order to ensure a full Catholic secondary school education in Waterloo Region from the mid-1800s to 1985.

As you enter this Lenten season may you reflect on the value our schools bring to your life – whether you are a parent, student or staff member. The outcome of our work will be to respond to a request by the **Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC)** to write into policy our Board's view of, and commitment to, inclusion. 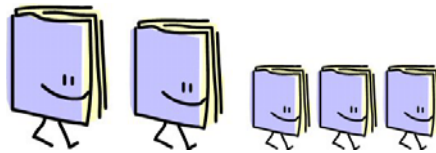
The following is excerpted from a recent letter written by retired principal Harry Kieswetter to WCDSB Principals. Harry and his wife Sue are currently working at a school in Doha, Qatar. His letter demonstrates how Waterloo Region's Catholic Schools are making a difference not just at home, but halfway around the world:

*"I extend warmest greetings from Doha, Qatar (no pun intended). Actually we too are entering our winter season and the temperature today is 28 Celsius, and I am watching workers next door who are wearing sweaters to ward off the cold..."*

*...Foremost, I want to sincerely thank you for the generous support of textbooks and other resources that you gave to the Philippine School of Doha. To say the resources and textbooks were needed and appreciated would be a gross understatement...*

*...I want to give you a sense of the extent of the initiative you were part of: 424 boxes of books were sent from K-W to Doha on July 13<sup>th</sup> in a 20 foot container: Estimated value @ \$125K to \$150K...*

*...Pick-up and loading of the books was carried out by my sister Joanne Germann, retired teacher Kevin Nugent, retired principals Brian Cullen, Paul Hicknell, Jim Orrange and St. Aloysius Staff members Paola Silva and Veronica Gallant -- plus members of their Grade 8 class. I think when you see the young students savoring the books it proves the adage of a picture being worth a thousand words. Again...thanks to each of you".*

## Eva Olsson's Message Of Hope & Forgiveness

On January 22 & 23 Waterloo Region's Catholic Schools were fortunate to host the incomparable **Eva Olsson**.

On the 22<sup>nd</sup> Eva spoke to a gathering of Board administrators and on the 23<sup>rd</sup> she spoke to students at **Blessed Kateri CES** in Kitchener and **Mother Teresa CES** in Cambridge.

Eva is a Holocaust survivor and a much sought after speaker across the country. Over the years she has spoken to thousands of students, parents, and educators in an attempt to have her message heard. Eva delivers a powerful message around tolerance, acceptance and dignity of the person – all lessons that have risen from the ruins of her own experiences while living through the Nazi controlled concentration camps.

Eva's talk does not focus so much on the atrocities of her

experiences as it does the lessons that have been learned and the strong conviction that it must never happen again.

Eva calls on her audiences to put into practice the beliefs of tolerance and compassion.

Her message resonates with audiences for years after.

In addition to Eva's speaking engagements she has also written two books and produced a DVD of her childhood experiences.

To make her point with students she asked them how many regularly use the word "hate" – and many hands rose.

Then she said this:

*"I don't like that my family were murdered," Eva said. "But I don't hate those that murdered my family...I don't use the word hate..."*

*What hate did [then], hate still does".*

Eva went on to ask students to embrace tolerance, acceptance of differences and respect for others – to become ambassadors for peace.

She encouraged the students to abandon bullying and to never let themselves be a silent participant by not stopping bullying when they see it. *"Don't be a bystander, don't be silent,"* she said.

*"Remember, today is a new day. Today, you can make a difference".*

Today ... 64 years after the end of World War II ... 84-year-old Eva Olsson still makes a difference.
