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2007/08 Off To A Great Start!

EQAO Scores Surpass The Provincial Average For 2nd Year Running

What better way to launch a new school year than with a celebration of our 2006-07 *Education Quality & Accountability Office (EQAO)* results for Grades 3, 6 & 9 – where we beat the provincial average in **all** assessment categories in **all three grades** for the second year in a row!

The assessments in grades three and six covered reading, writing and mathematics. The grade nine assessment covered mathematics alone – at both the “applied” and the “academic” levels. The figures provided below show the percentage of the Board’s students who scored at levels three and four on a scale of one to four – thereby meeting or exceeding government expectations.

Students in all publicly-funded elementary and secondary schools in Ontario -- including all 47 Catholic elementary schools and five Catholic high schools in Waterloo Region – participated in the assessments. The provincial average is noted in brackets beside the WCDSB score in each assessment category below:



WCDSB Grade 3 Results: *Reading 66%* (62%) ---- *Writing 69%* (64%) ---- *Mathematics 73%* (69%).
WCDSB Grade 6 Results: *Reading 65%* (64%) ---- *Writing 63%* (61%) ---- *Mathematics 61%* (59%).
WCDSB Grade 9 Applied Level Results: *Mathematics 41%* (35%)
WCDSB Grade 9 Academic Level Results: *Mathematics 73%* (71%)

The Board’s five-year assessment score trend is even more revealing of the Board’s success. The figure given below for each category shows the Board’s percentage improvement from 2002-03 to 2006-07:

Grade 3: *Reading +13%* ---- *Writing +12%* ---- *Mathematics +13%*.
Grade 6: *Reading +7%* ---- *Writing +9%* ---- *Mathematics +7%*.
Grade 9 (Applied): *Mathematics +9%*
Grade 9 (Academic): *Mathematics 0%* -- score remains steady at 73%



BUDGET 2007/08 – INVESTING IN OUR FUTURE

On June 25th the Board of Trustees unanimously approved the 2007-2008 school year budget.

- **Total Operating:** \$191,125,354
- **Total Capital:** \$15,756,476
- **Total Operating & Capital:** \$206,881,830

Expenditures on **Special Education** have increased by \$337,000 over 2006-07, while expenditures on **Board Administration** – which comprises just three percent of the total operating budget -- have decreased by \$184,000 (3%). The **Capital** portion of the budget includes \$3.5 million for school renewal – a 17% increase over 2006-07. We're proud to be delivering a top value Catholic education while carefully managing every dollar.

When You Have Questions/Concerns At School...

We have very successful communication guidelines in place to facilitate communications between you and our school system. Please review these guidelines and use them when you have a concern or suggestion:

Step One: Speak to the staff member. (If the issue is not resolved, proceed to step two).

Step Two: Speak to the principal. If you have not yet spoken to the staff member involved, the principal will ask you to do so first.

The Role of the Principal:

The principal will involve the staff member in any discussions with the parent(s). The principal may request, at any step in the process, that concerns be put in writing. The principal may also involve others who may be helpful in resolving the concern; that is, supports from the school board, employee group representatives, the local parish, community agencies.

The Role of Trustees:

Parents may contact any Trustee at any time. The Trustee will direct the parent

to follow the process outlined above.

The Role of the School Council:

The role of the School Council is to provide a way for parents to provide advice to the Principal on the learning plan for the school. The School Council is not a forum to discuss parent-teacher-student issues. If these matters are brought to any School Council member or any School Council meeting, the concern is to be referred immediately to the principal who will ensure the proper process is followed.



Safety & Security Are Tops In Waterloo Region's Catholic Schools

We're very proud in Waterloo Region's Catholic Schools to be recognized for our academic excellence.

But, in some ways, we're even prouder of the work we do to make our schools as safe and secure as possible. Our motto "**Quality, Inclusive, Faith-Based Education**" could very easily include the word "**Safe**" as well.

Recently, the Ontario Government introduced changes to the **Safe Schools Act** making "bullying" an act for which students can be suspended.

While this was certainly a welcome move, our Catholic schools have been at the forefront of anti-bullying education for quite some time.

In fact, we have worked closely with our friends at the public school board and the Regional health department since 2003 to implement a program called "**Imagine a School Without Bullying**".

The program – which grew out of a three-year pilot project called "**Good Kid Sid**" provides schools with ongoing training and support to assist staff in creating an atmosphere where bullying and other types of disrespectful behaviour are discouraged and stopped.

We were delighted when "**Imagine**" was named a provincially significant "best practice" by the **Ontario Safe Schools Action Team**.

The Board also maintains a very close working relationship with the **Waterloo Regional Police Service**. We are particularly grateful for the assistance we receive from the police on the issue of "stranger danger".

Japanese Students Visit WCDSB

On May 22, **St. Benedict** (Cambridge) and **St. David** (Waterloo) Catholic Secondary Schools hosted a group of 115 students and 10 teachers from the **Toyota Technical Skills Academy** in Japan. The school -- with students aged 15 to 19 -- prepares youth to become future supervisors in the mechanical, machining and other technical fields.

The academy opened in 1938, a year after the Toyota Motor Corporation was formed. The Japanese students spent two days in the high schools experiencing Canadian education and putting their English skills to use.

This was the sixth visit by students from the Toyota Technical Skills Academy to the Region. Their visits are an excellent opportunity for our Canadian students to experience another culture and make friends across an increasingly global community.

Robotics Team Strikes Gold

Last June the Trustees and Administration of Waterloo Region's Catholic Schools were thrilled to congratulate the student team of **Ian Hillier, Jamie Hobson, John Nguyen, Ken Nguyen**, their teacher advisor **Norm Dutrisac**, and the **Tech Department from Resurrection Catholic Secondary School** for their winning performance in the **Robotics Team Competition** at the **Skills Canada National Competition** held in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.

The primary objective of the robotics challenge was for the students to (within a strict set of rules) adapt an existing piece of robotic equipment to enable it to control a soccer ball, navigate its way up a ramp, and deposit the ball into a goal.

Ontario's Skills Canada Team won a total of 42 medals competing against the best of the best from 10 provinces/3 territories.

The **Resurrection CSS Robotics Team** described their winning performance during a visit to the Catholic Education Centre in June.
